Put Some Teeth Into Your Future.

You know from visiting the dentist that dental hygienists do a lot. But did you know how much? They're licensed dental health specialists, providing patients with preventative, educational and therapeutic services, while promoting oral health and controlling oral disease. They observe and record abnormalities, take oral X-rays, apply fluoride and fissure sealants. They also provide periodical therapies, such as root planning, plaque, calculus and stain removal. The framework for this type of oral care is known as the dental hygiene, or DH, process of care.

Students in the Carrington College® Dental Hygiene program develop the skills to give comprehensive dental hygiene care, including professional communication skills and a knowledge of ethical standards and behavior. The program culminates in an Associate of Science degree in Dental Hygiene. We prepare our graduates to take the Dental Hygiene National Board and state licensing examinations.† Licensing examinations vary by state. Information is available from the campus program director and in the clinical manual.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment of dental hygienists is expected to grow 33% from 2012-2022.‡

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the Dental Hygiene program, graduates will be able to:

- Deliver comprehensive dental hygiene care to patients in a variety of professional settings via the DH process of care.
- Demonstrate proficiency in critical thinking and information management.

Admission/Progression Requirements

In addition to meeting the College's standard admission requirements, candidates must:

- · Submit a statement of interest/essay on becoming a dental hygienist.
- Pass the Wonderlic General Assessment of Instructional Needs (GAIN) test with a minimum score of 4 on both the English and Math components.

The following credentials, which are preferred but not required, earn applicants additional points during the admissions process. Appropriate documentation must be submitted prior to the application deadline, which is generally five days before classes begin.

- Completion of a dental assisting certificate, diploma or associate degree.
- Expanded Functions Credentials, current RDA or CDA certificate. Copy of current license or certificate must be submitted.
- College degree (not including an associate degree in dental assisting).
- Work experience in the dental field. Employment verification form must be submitted.

Prior to entering direct patient care, students must:

- Provide negative TB test results. (Test results more than 12 months old must be from a two-step test). Applicants with prior positive results must undergo a chest X-ray.
- Provide proof of childhood MMR immunization or titer.
- Provide proof of Hepatitis B vaccination or written refusal.
- Provide proof of chickenpox immunization (only students who have not had chickenpox).
- Submit to drug screening and background checks immediately prior to clinical rotations, the results of which may affect eligibility to participate in clinical rotations.
- Hold a current Basic Life Support (BLS)/CPR card.
